1st Canadian Divisional Ammunition Column

Historique

Mise sur pied en août 1914 sous le commandement du Lieutenant-Colonel J. J. Penhale.

Mobilisée à Valcartier.

Quitte Québec 30 septembre 1914 à bord du MEGANTIC and MONTEZUMA.

Arrive en Angleterre 14 octobre 1914.

Effectifs : 30 officiers, 561 autres grades.

Arrive en France le 12 février 1915. *1st Canadian Divisional Artillery*.

Retourne en Angleterre le 21 mars 1919.

Démantelée en vertu de l'ordre général 191 du 1^{er} novembre 1920.

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2nd Canadian Divisional Ammunition Column

Historique

Mise sur pied en mars 1915 sous le commandement du Lieutenant-Colonel W. H. Harrison.

Autorisation publiée dans l'ordre général 36 du 15 mars 1915.

Les sections sont recrutées et mobilisées à Toronto, Winnipeg, Montréal et Saint John.

La section 1 quitte Saint John le 13 juin 1915 à bord du CALEDONIA et arrive en Angleterre le 22 juin 1915.

Les sections 2 à 4 quittent Montréal le 16 mai 1915 à bord du CORINTHIAN et arrivent en Angleterre le 27 mai 1915.

Arrive en France le 17 septembre 1915. *2nd Canadian Divisional Artillery*.

Démobilisée à Saint John et Montréal en mai 1919.

Démantelée en vertu de l'ordre général 191 du 1^{er} novembre 1920.

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3rd Canadian Divisional Ammunition Column

Historique

Mise sur pied en décembre 1915 sous le commandement du Lieutenant-Colonel W. G. Hurdman.

Autorisation publiée dans l'ordre général 69 du 15 juillet 1916.

La section No.1 est recrutée à Kingston, la section No. 2 à Toronto et la section No. 3 à Winnipeg. Une quatrième section est rajoutée en Angleterre mais l'unité est réduite à trois sections en juin 1917.

Quitte Saint John le 17 mars 1916 à bord du METAGMA.

Arrive en Angleterre le 25 mars 1916.

Arrive en France le 15 juillet 1916. *3rd Canadian Divisional Artillery*.

Retourne en Angleterre 19 février 1919.

Arrive en Canada en mars 1919. Démobilisée à Ottawa et Toronto.

Démantelée en vertu de l'ordre général 191 du 1^{er} novembre 1920.

Autorisée par le corps canadien Q/9/2/1 du 31 mai 1917.

Mobilisée à Bouvigny Huts le 25 juin 1917. Les *1st*, *2nd* et *3rd Canadian Divisional Ammunition Columns* fournissent chacune une section.

Effectifs : 10 officiers, 485 autres grades.

Retourne en Angleterre le 26 avril 1919.

Arrive au Canada en mai 1919.

Démantelée en vertu de l'ordre général 191 du 1^{er} novembre 1920.

Historique

Mise sur pied en mars 1916 comme *4th Divisional Ammunition Column*. Commandée par le Lieutenant-Colonel R. Costigan.

Autorisation publiée dans l'ordre général 69 du 15 juillet 1916.

Mobilisée à Petawawa.

La section No.1 est recrutée à Montréal, la section No. 2 à Halifax et la section No. 3 à Vancouver.

Quitte Halifax le 13 septembre 1916 à bord du NORTHLAND.

Arrive en Angleterre le 22 septembre 1916.

Effectifs : 14 officiers, 506 autres grades.

Devient *5th Canadian Divisional Ammunition Column* le 6 avril 1917.

Arrive en France le 22 août 1917.

Retourne au Canada en juin 1919.

Démobilisée à Montréal, Halifax et Vancouver.

Démantelée en vertu de l'ordre général 191 du 1^{er} novembre 1920.
