Formed by the amalgamation of the 50th Regiment and the 88th Regiment (Victoria Fusiliers) and designated The Canadian Scottish Regiment, 15 March 1920.

Reorganized as a two-battalion regiment, 1 August 1930.

"A" Company of the 11th Machine Gun Battalion (authorized 1 June 1919) amalgamated with the 2nd Battalion and the unit was designated as the 2nd Battalion (Machine Gun), The Canadian Scottish Regiment, 15 December 1936.

The 1st Battalion became the 3rd (Reserve) Battalion after a 1st Battalion was authorized to serve in the Canadian Active Service Force, 7 November 1940.

The 3rd Battalion was converted and redesignated as the 3rd (Reserve) Battalion, The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Machine Gun), 26 March 1942.

2nd Battalion converted and redesignated as the 66th Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment (Canadian Scottish Regiment), 1 April 1946.

The regiment was redesignated as The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's), 29 April 1948.

The 66th Light Anti-Aircraft Regiment and the 62nd Anti-Tank Battery (Self-Propelled) (which had been authorized on 15 October1929 as the 62nd Field Battery (How.)) were amalgamated with The Canadian Scottish Regiment (Princess Mary's) under the latter designation, 31 December 1954.

Four more squadrons authorized in order that two four-squadron regiments might be formed, 1 April 1911.

The two regiments were designated as the 1st Regiment British Columbia Horse and the 2nd Regiment British Columbia Horse. Headquarters of the 1st Regiment were at Vernon and the squadrons were at Lumby, Vernon, Armstrong and Kelowna, 1 December 1911.

The 1st Regiment was redesignated as the 30th Regiment British Columbia Horse, 15 April 1912.
